Implemented Activities

Clinical Research Matching Scheme:

- Clinical and academic staff were invited to submit projects to a central database, to which students registered with specification of their area of interest. Faculty matched interested students to relevant supervisors and provided support and guidance throughout project development.

Surgical Research Evening:

- A series of talks by clinicians at all stages of academic training in surgery.

Medical Research Evening:

- A series of talks by clinicians at all stages of academic training in medicine.

Careers in Academia:

- A full day pan-specialty workshop including advice about incorporating research into clinical practice as well as highlighting opportunities for parallel training.

Intercalating Event:

- An evening event comprising a series of short talks and a 'fayre' of those departments offering intercalated degrees.

Student Involvement in Undergraduate Curriculum Design:

- The new curriculum includes a research/scholastic theme, for which students have been pivotal in its design.

Impacts

The Development of a Research and Scholastic Theme:

- Involvement with INSPIRE has assisted with the development of a research and scholastic theme within the new curriculum, for which students have been central to the design and refinement. The School anticipates this theme will provide all students with the skills in research methodology necessary for a career in clinical practice.

Workshops and Seminars:

- The School has provided a series of workshops and seminars to raise the profile of careers in academia across all disciplines, some of which remain available online for future students. This has culminated in the 're-launch' of our intercalated MRes programme through an extremely popular and well-attended event.
